Rishel Angus Donates 2006 Angus Foundation Heifer

The Bill Rishel family of Rishel Angus, North Platte, Neb., will donate the 2006 Angus Foundation Heifer, set to sell at 2 p.m., Jan. 12, 2006, during the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) in Denver, Colo.

B/R Ruby of Tiffany 4214, a February 2004 daughter of Twin Valley Precision E161, will headline the package. Her dam is B/R Ruby of Tiffany 9148, a daughter of N-Bar Emulation EXT. As a special feature this year, the heifer is bred to Ironwood New Level and expected to calve in early February 2006.

In addition to the heifer, the buyer will receive 30 days of free insurance from American Live Stock Insurance Co., Geneva, Ill.; free transportation to the buyer's farm or ranch provided by Lathrop Livestock Transportation, Dundee, Ill.; and a flush and three embryo implants into the buyer's recipient cows from Trans Ova Genetics, Sioux Center, Iowa.

The sale of the package will precede the NWSS Angus Bull Sale, scheduled to take place in the Beef Palace Auction Arena. All proceeds from the heifer package go to the Angus Foundation, a not-for-profit organization that funds and supports programs involving education, youth and research in the Angus breed and the agricultural industry.

Milford Jenkins, Angus Foundation director of development, says B/R Ruby of Tiffany

4214 was specifically selected by the Rishels for the special purpose of the Angus Foundation Heifer fund-raiser. "The Rishels' offer to throw in the bonus sale feature of 4214 being bred to Ironwood New Level for a projected February 2006 calf was



even more humbling to the Angus Foundation," Jenkins says. "As with prior buyers and donors of the Angus Foundation heifer packages, this unselfish and generous validation of the Rishels' endorsement of the importance to raise funds for the Angus Foundation will be an inspiration for many years to come for all of us involved in the Angus breed!"
