Junior activities

Katy Kemp, Bridgeport, Texas, is the Association's junior activities intern. Kemp, who is the daughter of Thomas and Evie

Kemp, will assist in planning and implementing National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) events, including the National Junior Angus Show (Njas) and the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development (LEAD) Conference. She will also travel to regional shows.

Kemp, who was a Gold Award recipient in 2006, says she is excited about the opportunity to remain involved in junior activities. "I hope to learn more about the processes that develop memorable programs and events for juniors," Kemp says.

Kemp experienced these programs while active in the NJAA and Texas Junior Angus Association. She remains involved in the breed as a partner in her family's operation, Kemp Angus Farm.
