## **Public relations**

Tammy Ettredge, Pilot Point, Texas, is the 2006 public relations intern for the Association. Ettredge will spend the summer writing news releases and stories, as well as traveling to Angus shows and events, where she will take photographs.

Ettredge graduated from Tarleton State University in May with a bachelor's degree in animal industries and a minor in communications.
