Workshops and guest speakers are the foundation of any leadership conference, but Fisher says the tours and recreational activities are an important part of the conference, because they help build lasting relationships among junior members from across the country.

"You can't entirely build a relationship by sitting in a classroom and listening to a speaker present," he says. "There has to be that interaction between the individuals attending the conference, so they can build those relationships that will stay with them after they leave the conference and last throughout the rest of their lives."

Although the conference is geared for junior members, parents and advisors can easily find value in it, too. Fisher says he encourages adults to participate in the workshops, because the adult-youth interaction "helps create better relationships and facilitates understanding between the generations.

"The decisions you make today, such as attending this conference, will help establish the opportunities that you will have down the road," he continues. "The relationships help open doors for you, and your leadership skills get you jobs and help you succeed in your career."
